# Stitching the 2016 Taste of **Hyde Park Quilt**

Sometimes Michele Makinen gets ideas from the fabrics she has on hand, youtube videos, quilting magazines, and sometimes it just comes to her - it always does.

For the past three years -- and this year -- she has been making the quilt for the Taste of Hyde Park silent auction. "Thinking of the needs of a family in transitional housing was easy, it wasn't a leap at all," said Makinen, who spent a career as a social worker helping families and couples through therapy.

She first got interested in quilting six years ago when she picked up a quilting book and a quilting arts magazine. Later, she took a couple of quilting classes at the Hyde Park Art Center where she met other quilters.

Together they started the Lakeside Quilting Guild which has grown to about 30 people in three years. The guild made and continues to make guilts for the families as they go through the HPTHP program.

This year's Taste quilt will take at least three weeks to complete. First, Makinen washes and dries the fabric to preshrink it. "Some fabrics shrink differently than others and you don't want any surprises," she said.

She then irons the fabric smooth to cut the precise shapes that she will sew into a twin-bed size. "Let's see, 15 inches drop on sides and a little extra for tucking in the pillow...It'll be 96 inches by 70 inches wide," she said.

Then it goes to be long-arm quilted at a place in Peotone. When that's done, she sews on the backing and around the sides.

This year's Taste quilt will probably be made from Batik fabric, which is finely woven cotton fabric dyed in Indonesia. Makinen has a lot of Batik in her house now, so it might inspire her.

But then again, maybe her artistic talent will be moved by something else. You'll just have to come see.
